




An Evening with... Will Self —Secular Sermon & in conversation with Mark Lawson

Specialising in culture and the arts, Mark Lawson is best known for presenting the flagship BBC Radio 4 arts programme *Front Row* between 1998 and 2014.







Maura Dooley's most recent collection of poetry is The Silvering (Bloodaxe). In 2015 she was Poet-in-Residence at the Jane Austen House Museum and poems from the residency form A Quire of Paper. She has twice been shortlisted for the TS Eliot Award and the Forward Single Poem Award and has received an Eric Gregory and a Cholmondeley Award. She teaches at Goldsmiths and is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature. Abigail Parry spent seven years as a toymaker before completing her PhD on play in contemporary poetry. She is Poet-in-Residence at the National Videogame Arcade. Her poems have been printed onto mirrors, scattered over London from a helicopter and published in journals and anthologies. She received an Eric Gregory Award in 2010, and won the Ballymaloe International Poetry Prize and the Troubadour International Poetry Prize in 2016.

on loss and recovery in six parts that asks, How far must we change to overcome the past? And what of ourselves will we have lost in so doing?




